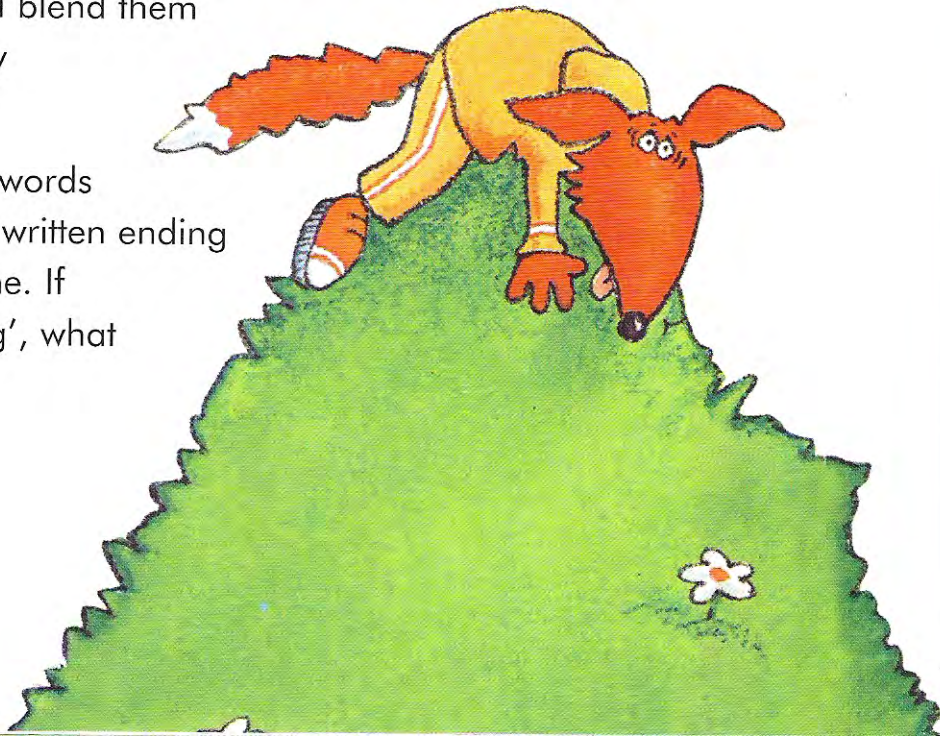


HOW TO USE Phonics

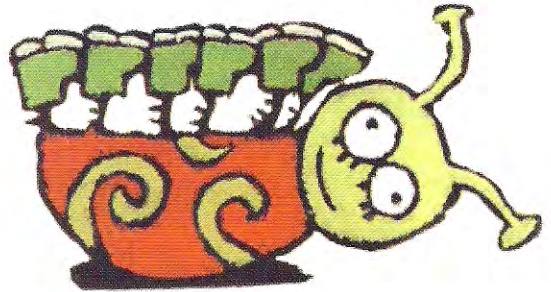
BOOK 3

The stories in Book 3 introduce your child to two of the five short vowel sounds – o as in fox and u as in mud – and the ch, sh and th sounds. They will help your child begin reading simple words containing these sounds.

- Read each story through to your child first. Familiarity helps children to identify some of the words and phrases.
- Have fun talking about the sounds and pictures together. What repeated sound can your child hear in each story?
- Help your child break new words into separate sounds (eg. h-o-t) and blend them together to say the word.
- Point out how words with the same written ending sound the same. If b-ug says 'bug', what does m-ug or r-ug say?



- Some common words, such as 'your', 'who' and even 'the', can't be read by sounding out. Help your child practise recognising words like these.



Phonic fun

Write down some of the simple story words on cards. Cut off the first letter (or the ch, sh or th beginning) from each. Help your child pair up beginnings with endings to make and read as many words as he or she can. Then cut the endings into separate letters, and play the game again.

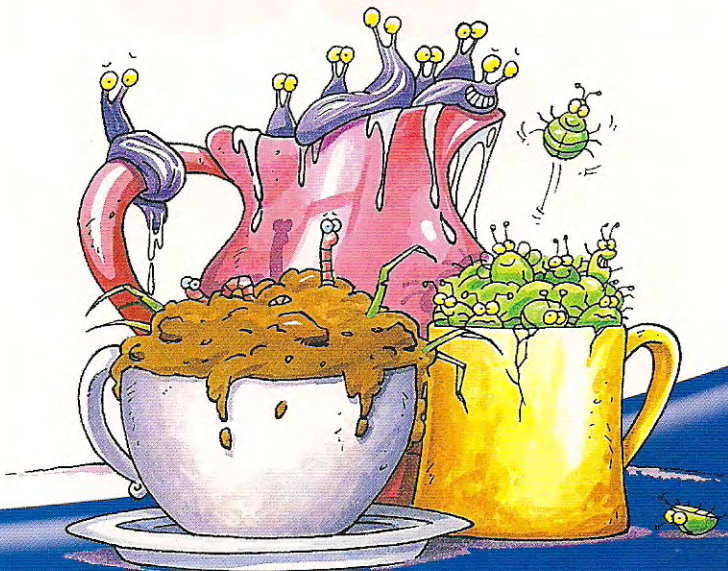
This is an important step towards independent reading – it will enable your child to tackle new words by sounding out and blending their separate parts.
