


whole (adj) total, complete



queue (n) people waiting in a line

There was a long **queue** for the bus today.

review (n) a short description of something with a person's opinion about it

ride (n) riding on something for a short time

Anna had a **ride** on the roundabout.

rifle range (n) a stall at a funfair where you can shoot a toy gun at something and win a prize

Dad won a big teddy bear at the **rifle range**.

roller coaster (n) a train you can ride on at a funfair




